The Psalms of Ascent (Psalms 120-134) begin with the theme of repentance, and departure from deceit, unrest, and war. The faithful Hebrew pilgrims journeyed together to Jerusalem, seeking to worship and celebrate their God. They sang these songs as they traveled, leaving the trappings of 'every day' behind, as they sought the LORD together.

May we too find ways to turn away from the world and seek the LORD together, to bless and be blessed.

It was a turning away from the world and a turning toward God; the initial move in a life-goal set on God. The way of discipleship that began in an act of repentance concludes in a life of praise and blessing (E. Peterson, 1980).

Blessing is the power to grow and live fully in the world and is possible because of the divine presence. The concluding blessing speaks the hope that the presence and power of the creator will go with the worshiping community into all of life. This God focuses on the relationship with this pilgrim community and extends the loyal love and trustworthiness emphasized in the Psalter even to the point of risk. This God—intensely present in Zion—goes with the pilgrims into the fray of the rest of life (W. Brueggemann. W. Bellinger, 2014).

May blessed and blessing be the two words which describe our lives.
